




Wheelpower

 to empower parents/carers and young people to participate and have their say in review meetings.

Objectives:

- to enable parents/carers and young people to feel more confident to have their say at review meetings.
- to provide information on the process of an annual review of an Educational, Health and Care Plan (EHCP) including what to expect at the annual review meeting.

- To understand that preparing for adulthood starts in year 9
- To consider options for post 16 education and the support that is available in mainstream colleges
- To be aware that some decision-making rights transfer to a young person, post 16
